What exactly is a government shutdown?

The US government operates like any other business.

This means that at the end of every fiscal year, from October 1 of the previous year through September 30 of the current one, Congress approves the amount of funding each department will receive to pay for staff and other day-to-day expenses. While the budgets are usually straightforward, lawmakers from both political parties often use the process to get their desired policies or special spending needs approved. Since these inevitably lead to extended debates, the funding deadline often gets pushed back. Most years, lawmakers approve short-term bills to keep agencies and departments operating until a longer-term agreement is reached.

Most countries have installed specific mechanisms to prevent such political gridlock. However, the US Government relies on the Congress to agree and pass 12 appropriation bills.



Okay, so why did the government shutdown?

The 2018-2019 budget process was running smoothly until mid-December, when lawmakers, trying to approve funding for Homeland Security, disagreed on the amount to allocate for security along the Mexican border.

Republicans wanted to set aside \$5 billion to build a wall, while Democrats were only willing to approve an additional \$1.3 billion to pay for the state-of-the art technology and increased communication capabilities recommended by experts.

With the holidays approaching, the US Senate passed a short-term spending bill on Wednesday, December 19, 2018 to keep the affected departments running through February 8, 2019, giving lawmakers time to reach a compromise when they returned in the New Year.

However, President Trump refused to sign the bill unless the Democrats agreed to fund the wall, leaving agencies scrambling to set in motion their plans to cease – or partially cease – operations by midnight December 21, 2018.



So, now what?

On January 25th, President Donald Trump agreed to a deal to reopen the government for three weeks, backing down from his demand that Congress give him money for his border wall.

Both the House and Senate approved a bill funding the government until Feb. 15. If a compromise is not made by then, well, it is unclear what could happen next.

"We really have no choice but to build a powerful wall or steel barrier," President Trump said. "If we don't get a fair deal from Congress, the government will either shut down on Feb. 15,

or I will use the powers afforded to me under the laws and Constitution of the United States to address this emergency."

Hopefully, US lawmakers will reach a compromise, that will make both parties happy, soon.

Malaysia's New Agong

Al-Sultan Abdullah Ri'ayatuddin Al-Mustafa Billah Shah took the oath as the country's 16th Yang di-Pertuan Agong.

Previous Agong, Sultan Muhammad's final decree to Malaysians as Agong was to "continue together in maintaining unity, tolerance and join hands in bearing the responsibility for this sovereign country so that Malaysia remains peaceful and harmonious".

ETIAS Visa

Malaysia respects the decision made by the European Union on their implementation of the European Travel Information and Authorisation System (ETIAS) in bid to strengthen border control and minimise threats to Schengen countries.

The ETIAS is a new immigration process which is set to commence in 2020. Malaysians are required to pay a fee of EUR10 (RM47.10) for the application. Countries that require ETIAS online authorisation include Austria, Belgium, Denmark, Finland, France, Germany, Greece, Luxembourg, Monaco, Netherlands, Norway, Poland, Portugal, Spain, Sweden, and Switzerland.

Corruption-Free Malaysia

The government has launched a five-year National Anti-Corruption Plan (NACP) with the aim of making Malaysia a corrupt-free nation by 2023.


The plan has 22 strategies and 115 initiatives, with strong focus given to six main sectors, namely: politics, public procurement, law enforcement, public sector administration, legal and judiciary, and corporate governance. Minimum penalty for graft, anti-lobbying law are among the highlights of the plan.

The Deal with the East Coast Railway Link

Malaysia will be "impoverished" if the government proceeds with the East Coast Railway Link project, says Tun Dr Mahathir Mohamad.

"We are burdened with heavy debts. We seek understanding from all parties. We will be impoverished by the project if we go on. The huge compensation for cancelling it is not as huge as the amount we have to carry for the next 30 years," he said to reporters after launching the National Anti-Corruption Plan on Tuesday.

The official status of the project will be announced by the Ministry of Finance soon.

HUMANS VS ECONS

Richard H. Thaler, a 2017 nobel prize winner for his contribution for behavioral economics, thought otherwise during his teaching career. He wanted to distinguish students who really mastered the materials from the middle group who understood the basic concepts and from those who simply did not understand - He made the test difficult. He found that his students were angry at him when the average test result was 72 out of 100. Instead of making the test easier, he made it so that the test would be out of 137 points. Everybody was happy when the average was 96 out of 137 (70%).

In the eye of an Econ, a hypothetical rational beings, no one should be happier with 70% when compared to a 72%. Thaler should have gotten more complaints. But the complaints stopped mainly because of two things. First, the average of 96, with some students scoring above 100, produced a positive effect on the students. Second, dividing a number by 137 is not natural for the mind. Nonetheless, the students were acting irrationally. In future editions of the newsletter, the Humans vs Econs series will explore more cases that touches on the irrational behavior that Humans make in their everyday lives. We will touch on some basic behavioral economic concepts that will hopefully shape the way you make decisions for the better.


